Remind them that quantity is important in this exercise, not quality. Call time after one minute. Students repeat the second writing exercise with the same prompt, errors corrected. Repeat entire process one last time. Indicators of progress include the number of words written per minute in the first and third iteration. The key to this task is the complexity of the reading material: In a large class with limited resources, this might be a challenge. Tell students they will read a text for one minute. Remind them this is not a test, nor is it part of their grade. Teacher calls time after 60 seconds. Students count the words read and write the number on a recording sheet. Students repeat the process by re-reading the same text, counting and recording. Ideally, this activity should be run once per week in conjunction with an extensive reading program. The main indicator of improvement is an increase over time in reading speed. How to gauge reading speeds? Some observers suggest word per minute wpm is slow and wpm is good. However, these numbers can vary based on a wide number of factors. Timed Repeated Speaking There are a number of speaking fluency activities around the web. Break students into pairs. Ask students to read the dialogue together. This is the baseline. Tell students they will repeat the dialogue though they must do it faster than the baseline. Students repeat the dialogue. Call time 5 seconds before the baseline. Repeat 3 to 5 more times with students changing partners frequently. After a few iterations, students may be able to finish the dialogue before the teacher calls time because they memorize the text rather than read it from the book. Fluent speakers and readers embed in their voices accuracy in speech as well as appropriate speed, phrasing, and expression. When the speaker uses these elements, it makes it easier for the listener to understand. Speaking in appropriate phrases, emphasizing certain words, raising and lowering volume, and varying intonation all help the listener. Fluent readers decode words accurately and automatically. At the automatic level, readers are able to decode words with minimal attention to decoding because they recognize the words instantly. They also make sense of the text as they read. When they use volume, tone, emphasis, phrasing, and other elements of oral expression, it means that they are interpreting and constructing meaning from the passage. With ELLs, it is especially important to check not just for fluency, but for comprehension as well. Many ELLs can be deceptively fast and accurate in their reading because they are good readers in their primary language. Yet, they may demonstrate little understanding of the text. Students may read fast, but with insufficient comprehension. Fluency without comprehension will require instructional intervention in vocabulary and comprehension skills. Since fluency is multidimensional, it is important to teach and monitor the following skills: Accuracy in word decoding Rate automatic recognition of words in connected text Expressive and meaningful interpretation of text The three dimensions of fluency can be assessed with the strategies below. Assessing accuracy and rate in English Accuracy can be assessed by the percentage of words a reader can read correctly. Informal reading inventories can use levels of performance charts such as: Here is a quick way to measure both accuracy and rate. Accuracy refers to how well students use decoding skills. Rate is how many words they can accurately decode in one minute. Ask the student to read the passage for one minute. Emphasize that the text should be read aloud in a normal way. Mark any uncorrected errors made by the student such as: Mark the end point in the text after one minute of reading. Repeat steps with two different passages. Use the median or middle score for analysis. Divide the number of words read correctly per minute by the total number of words read. This number will be a percentage.

Without fluency, the world of imagination, humor, and drama contained in the finest books is no more than a tangle of words. One definition of fluency is the ability to read aloud expressively and with understanding. When fluent readers read aloud, the text flows as if strung together like pearls on a necklace, rather than sounding halting and choppy. Here are some strategies to help second through fifth graders make important gains in this area. Before you use these techniques, however, you should assess your students and determine their needs. If there are only a few students, you may decide to work with them in small groups. Model Fluent Reading In order to read fluently, students must first hear and understand what fluent reading sounds like. From there, they will be more likely to transfer those experiences into their own reading. The most powerful way for you to help your students is to read aloud to them, often and with great expression. Following a read-aloud session, ask your students: Also, ask your students to think about how a fluent reader keeps the listener engaged. Do Repeated Readings in Class In their landmark book, *Classrooms That Work*, Patricia Cunningham and Richard Allington stress the importance and I agree of repeated readings as a way to help students recognize high-frequency words more easily, thereby strengthening their ease of reading. Having students practice reading by rereading short passages aloud is one of the best ways I know of to promote fluency. For example, choose a short poem to begin with, preferably one that fits into your current unit of study, and transpose it onto an overhead transparency. Make a copy of the poem for each student. Read the poem aloud several times while your students listen and follow along. Take a moment to discuss your reading behaviors such as phrasing i. Next, ask your students to engage in an "echo reading," in which you read a line and all the students repeat the line back to you. Following the echo reading, have students read the entire poem together as a "choral read. As such, they may be less apprehensive about making a mistake because they are part of a community of readers, rather than standing alone. Promote Phrased Reading in Class Fluency involves reading phrases seamlessly, as opposed to word by word. To help students read phrases better, begin with a terrific poem. After selecting a poem, write its lines onto sentence strips, which serve as cue cards, to show students how good readers cluster portions of text rather than saying each word separately. Hold up strips one at a time and have students read the phrases together. Reinforce phrased reading by using the same poem in guided reading and pointing to passages you read as a class. Enlist Tutors to Help Out Provide support for your nonfluent readers by asking tutors â€” instructional aides, parent volunteers, or older students â€” to help. The tutor and the student can read a preselected text aloud simultaneously. By offering positive feedback when the reader reads well, and by rereading passages when he or she struggles, the tutor provides a helpful kind of one-on-one support. The sessions can be short â€” 15 minutes at most. Plus, if you provide tutors with the text that you plan to use in an upcoming group lesson, you can give your nonfluent readers a jump start prior to the next lesson. In the exercise, meaning is conveyed through expression and intonation. The focus thus becomes interpreting the script rather than memorizing it. Getting started is easy. Simply give each student a copy of the script, and read it aloud as you would any other piece of literature. See script resources below. After your read-aloud, do an echo read and a choral read of the script to involve the entire class. Once the class has had enough practice, choose students to read the various parts. Put together a few simple props and costumes, and invite other classes to attend the performance. For the presentation, have readers stand, or sit on stools, in front of the room and face the audience. Encourage students to make eye contact with the audience and one another before they read. Once they start, they should hold their scripts at chest level to avoid hiding their faces, and look out at the audience periodically. After the performance, have students state their names and the part that they read. You might also want to videotape the performance so that you can review it with students later. In doing so, you will show them that they are,

indeed, fluent readers.

Level Correlation Chart Why Use Fluency Practice Passages Fluency is a key foundational skill that helps students read complex text with greater understanding. When students read with accuracy and expression at an appropriate reading rate, their fluency supports their comprehension. Repeated reading practice with short passages improves word recognition and automaticity. **How to Use Fluency Practice Passages** Passages are provided from Levels F to Z and are original fiction or nonfiction text that can be used for one-on-one reading, independent timed reading, or partner timed reading. Read the Fluency Assessment Passage to the student so she or he can hear fluent reading. Have the student read the passage. If the student gets stuck on a word, read the word and have her or him repeat it. Have a student start a stopwatch as she or he begins a passage, and stop it at the end of the passage. The student can record the words per minute and reading time on a chart or graph. One partner times the other partner reading a passage. At the end of one minute, the partner with the timer says, "Stop" and circles the last word read. This partner then marks the number of words read on the table at the bottom of the page. After several readings the partners then switch roles. Tell the student that if she or he has trouble struggling for more than 3 to 5 seconds, you will say the word so she or he can keep reading. After one minute, say "Stop," stop the stopwatch, and circle the last word read. During the reading, resist the urge to correct mistakes. Mistakes and self-correction will be accounted for in the score. If the student has extreme difficulty, stop the test. Reassure the student that she or he will redo the assessment after further reading practice. You should select a lower level passage for the next assessment. Follow along on your copy word by word with your pencil. Mark a dash above words skipped. Skipped words Word substitutions, including incorrect forms of the word Words in the wrong order; both or all words are counted as wrong Struggling that lasts for 3 to 5 seconds, or more The following are not considered misses: Added words Varying pronunciation due to accent, dialect, or speech impediment Repetitions in which the wording is correct Self-correcting a mistake; the word is scored as correct. Count the total words the student reads in one minute using the words-per-line totals listed in the margin. Write this in the chart at the bottom, along with the date of the reading. Count the number of errors slashes. Record the number in the "Errors" line for the read. Subtract the number of errors from the total number of words read to find the words correct per minute WCPM.
