Christ is the New Man that we are to put on; it is His image to which we are to be conformed; but in daily practice we do not yet bear His perfect holiness. James Gray [pictured left] comments on this passage as follows: Whatever they presented to God in worship were holy in the sense that they were consecrated to and appointed by Him. And yet these things themselves had iniquity. When the worshipper brought his bleeding victim as an offering for his sins his very act of bringing it had in it additional sin which required to be atoned for. We are by nature children of wrath, and now, although as believers on our Lord Jesus Christ we are regenerated by His Spirit, still in our flesh there dwelleth no good thing Rom. In every act of our worship there are imperfections and defilements, because there is present in that act the old evil nature along with the new. It helps us to see how deeply we need Him, and how great is the sovereign mercy and the boundless grace of God towards us in Him. The high priest in the tabernacle typifies Him, and the service he rendered for Israel, even int he iniquity of their holy things, typifies the service Christ has rendered and is rendering for us in a like case. For if there is iniquity in our holy things, thank God there is also atonement for it accomplished, and full, and of instant efficacy 1 John 2: In the light of this text, what Christian can question--musth less deny--the application to him at all times of the words of the apostle John: Who can talk about sinless perfection in the light of this truth? So deeply indeed is the truth of this text imbedded, as a living principle, in the experience of true and enlightened Christians, that the more devoted they are the more it is felt. It is indeed a test o four nearness to God to have a Christian conscience so cultivated as to appreciate our daily and hourly need, and at the same time our daily and hourly completeness only in Christ. This is the way to feast upon Him richly. If our faith, considered as an act, does itself require to have blood sprinkled upon it, then as we appreciate that fact shall our faith itself sink down more and more upon Christ for all that He is to us, and rest upon Him with the very rest of heaven. If no Christian who is himself personally accepted in Christ can put forth one act which does not need forgiveness, what can he do to commend himself to God who is unwashed in redeeming blood, and on whom even now abideth His condemnation? How to do the Object Lesson: Click to watch this video below, where I demonstrate this forgiveness object lesson. First, setup your table. To the side, have 4 small cups of coloured water each cup a different colour. Also, have a cross drawn on the 5th cup, and set it to the side. Draw a face on the top of the pop bottle. Now right here, where the mouth is? Seal the hole around the straw with either glue or sticky tack. Third, discuss the sins done against us that fill our hearts with anger or resentment. Right now, the bottle is empty. But I want to ask you a question: What are some things that your friends, or even your family members, do to you that make you really upset or angry sometimes? Your group can give you some examples, such as: Not inviting you out to play sports with them on the weekend? Making fun of you " maybe your grades, or your clothes, your hairstyle, or something else? Your parents have some strict rules that seem to be unreasonable? Maybe your brother or sister said something pretty nasty to you? As the group gives each example, pretend that one of the cups of coloured water represents that example. As that scenario happens, it can put anger, resentment, a grudge, or even hatred inside of us. Pour the water into the bottle. Repeat this for four different examples. By the end, the water inside the bottle will be an ugly brown colour. There are all kinds of things that can tick us off at one point or another. And you can see that it leaves us with a pretty disgusting mess of brown icky anger inside of us show the contents of the bottle. The thing is, when Jesus died on the cross, he paid the ultimate price for our sins " he died for us. When he did that, it says that he took on all the sins of the world, for all time, onto himself, and through his death and resurrection, God forgave those sins so that we could enjoy the ultimate forgiveness and be welcomed into His Kingdom. So I want to introduce this here balloon. Last, talk about prayer, forgiveness, and being filled with the Holy Spirit instead of anger. When you pray, ask the Holy Spirit to fill you up. Let go of the balloon so it starts to deflate. As it deflates, it pushes the anger of our hearts out through our mouths as we pray. So the anger just fills up that cup, and Jesus deals with it. Nor does it come naturally. But through prayer, what Jesus already did for us on the cross, and the work of the Holy Spirit in our hearts " these things make it possible for us to forgive completely the things that others have done to hurt us. The early Protestant Reformers, who were often scholars of Ancient Greek and also borrowed from Jewish scholarship, recognized that holiness is an attribute of God , and holiness is always part of the presence of God. Yet they also recognized that "practical holiness" was the evidence of the presence of God in the converted believer. Actions that demonstrated holiness would spring up, not premeditated, as believers focused more and more on their relationship with Christ. This was the life of faith , according to Luther; a life in which one recognizes that the sin inherent in human nature never departs, yet grace invades each human spirit and draws each person after Christ. Reformed[edit] Calvin , on the other hand, formulated a practical system of holiness that even tied in with culture and social justice. All unholy actions, Calvin reasoned, resulted in suffering. Thus he proved out to the city fathers of Geneva that dancing and other social vices always ended with the wealthy oppressing the poor. A holy life, in his outlook, was pietistic and simple, a life that shunned extravagance, excess, and vanity. On a personal level, Calvin believed that suffering would be a manifestation of taking on the Cross of Christ , but suffering was also part of the process of holiness. He expected that all Christians would suffer in this life, not as punishment, but rather as participation in union with Christ, who suffered for them. And yet, socially, Calvin argued that a holy society would end up as a gentle, kindly society except to criminals where the poor would be protected from the abuses of the wealthy, the lawyers, and others who normally preyed upon them.

Works of Piety In Methodism , holiness has acquired the secondary meaning of the reshaping of a person through spiritual rebirth. In the latter part of the 19th century revival meetings were held, attended by thousands. J in a camp meeting was begun and the National Holiness Camp Meeting Association went on to establish many holiness camp meetings across the nation. Some adherents to the movement remained within their denominations; others founded new denominations, such as the Free Methodist Church , the Church of the Nazarene , and the Church of God Anderson. Within a generation another movement, the Pentecostal movement was born, drawing heavily from the Holiness movement. Around the middle of the 20th century, the Conservative Holiness Movement , a conservative offshoot of the Holiness movement, was born. Holiness is not the end of progress, but deliverance from standing still. A T Pierson - The eagle is built for a solitary life. There is no bird so alone; other birds go in flocksâ€¦ the eagle never, two at most together, and they are mates. Its majesty consists partly in its solitariness. It lives apart because other birds can not live where and as it lives, and follow where it leads. The true child of God must consent to a lonely life apart with God, and often the condition of holiness is separation. Your whole usefulness depends on this, for your sermons last but an hour or two, your life preaches all the week. If Satan can only make a covetous

minister a lover of praise, of pleasure, of good eating, he has ruined your ministry. Give yourselves to prayer, and get your texts, your thoughts, your words from God. Luther spent his best three hours in prayer. Lighthouses blow no horns; they only shine! For example, if Jesus were to physically make His presence known, Sunday after Sunday there would be a heightened awareness of Holiness with confession, repentance, and restitution. Horatius Bonar wrote that holiness "extends to every part of our persons, fills up our being, spreads over our life, influences everything we are, or do, or think, or speak, or plan, small or great, outward or inward, negative or positive, our loving, our hating, our sorrowing, our rejoicing, our recreations, our business, our friendships, our relationships, our silence, our speech, our reading, our writing, our going out and our coming in"our whole man in every movement of spirit, soul, and body. At that time he had a child who was prone to put anything within reach into his mouth. Naturally he dug the shrub out and threw it away. Soon the shrub sprouted again. Repeatedly the missionary had to dig it out. There was no solution but to inspect the ground every day, and to dig up the shrub every time it surfaced. Indwelling sin is like that shrub. It needs constant uprooting. Our hearts need continual mortification. Develop a scriptural formula for holy living. Here is one possibility drawn from 1 Corinthians. When hesitant over a course of action, ask yourself: Does this glorify God? Sin will not die, unless it be constantly weakened. Spare it, and it will heal its wounds, and recover its strength. We must continually watch against the operations of this principle of sin: If we are negligent on any occasion, we shall suffer by it; every mistake, every neglect is perilous. Calvin - God sets us apart as a peculiar people for himself; then we ought to be free from all pollutions. And he quotes a sentence which had been often repeated by Moses. For as the people of Israel were on every side surrounded by heathens, from whom they might have easily adopted the worst examples and innumerable corruptions, the Lord frequently recalled them to himself, as though he had said, "Ye have to do with Me, ye are Mine; then abstain from the pollutions of the Gentiles. Thus it happens, that some lead others in troops to all kinds of evil, until the Lord by His calling separates them. Low and distorted views of sin reap low and distorted views of holiness. J C Ryle wrote that.. Wrong views about holiness are generally traceable to wrong views about human corruption. Sin is a blasting presence, and every fine power shrinks and withers in the destructive heat. Every spiritual delicacy succumbs to its malignant touch. Sin impairs the sight, and works toward blindness. Sin benumbs the hearing and tends to make men deaf. Sin perverts the taste, causing men to confound the sweet with the bitter, and the bitter with the sweet. Sin hardens the touch, and eventually renders a man "past feeling. It hoofs the spirit, and so reduces the area of our exposure to pain. Holiness gives evidence of your Justification and Election, and fosters assurance. Warfield wrote that Sanctification is but the execution of the justifying decree. For it to fail would be for the acquitted person not to be released in accordance with his acquittal. As John Owen says Holiness fits you for heaven Rev Neither can such persons enjoy God, nor would God be a reward to them. Jennifer is employed by Kalamazoo Community in Schools, is a writer and poet, wife of John, and the mother of "almost" 5 year old, Tom. Sometimes I do not want to define or label things, to pin down that which should be untethered. Much can be learned by occasionally resisting the temptation to define the indefinable by refusing to give form to the formless with inadequate words, sometimes freedom and a greater sense of truth can be found by forgoing the responsibility of naming something and instead, embracing the ambiguity of a moment, a person, a thing, of, well, stuff. At other times, most often when I am working on a poem, I obsess on the need to be precise. I must capture the essence of some thing. This thing demands exactitude, a word or words that illuminate its truth. Is it glistening or is it really shimmering? What exactly is it? But I digress! So when I came across Holy Stuff of Life displayed on a shelf in the church library, I felt an immediate affinity with the author and had to take it home. Holy Stuff of Life is a collection of writings by Heather Murray Elkins, in which extra virgin olive oil, spoons, rocks, tattoos and other sundry items are salvaged from the commonplace and transformed into the extraordinary. And in this quest, she discovers holy in the mundane. Stuff becomes transformed when a story becomes attached to it; a spoon becomes the weapon for Christians, a dead Christmas tree become a sign of redemption. Each chapter is short and can stand on its own. During a recent stay at our home, my mother-in-law picked up the book and found herself reading aloud passages to her husband, a retired Methodist minister. I found myself, after each piece, setting the book down, staring out a window and wondering things like: What am I holding onto that I should be letting go of? How do I forgive? What am I missing? Above all we must expect to be surprised. A man and his tool are not easily parted. It took my father both hands to drive a nail when he was eighty-five, but he was counting on being able to drive a nail when he turned ninety. A bleeding ulcer nearly swept him off the ladder of life, but he held on fiercely. Pumping the iron of the gospel gets him home for one more year. While most of her stories flow, her poems which are sprinkled throughout the book are another matter. While she explores interesting ideas within them, the poems amble off and lose their way. Contrast, for example, these simple, lovely lines within a story about how her mother responds to losing the family farmhouse to fire: She tells us to set the table, which means a lace cloth spread on the grass with mismatched spoons and saucers. Now is the winter of our discontent. An April ice can frost any fire in the belly. The line breaks are odd and the whole poem lacks rhythm. Just skip the poems. How can I live a holy life? In order to address the question of how to live a holy life, we must first understand what holy means. To be holy means to be set apart or separate from sin and evil. God is holyâ€”completely separate from everything that is evil 1 John 1: God calls us to be holy, just as He is 1 Peter 1: We must have the Holy Spirit indwelling us and filling us with His holiness. We can only live a holy life through the power of the Spirit; thus, the first step to living a holy life is to accept Jesus as Savior Ephesians 1: Once we have taken that step of salvation, we are declared righteous Romans 5: But what does it look like to be actually righteousâ€”to live a holy life? In 1 Thessalonians 4: When we live in obedience to God, we are staying separate from evil. The purpose of living a holy life is to glorify God and display His nature to those around us Matthew 5: Living a holy life of obedience to God is living in true freedom from the bondage of sin Romans 6: Satan would love nothing more than to bring us back into bondage through disobedience. The Holy Spirit will produce Christlikeness in us, and, as we yield to Him, we can live a holy life Galatians 5: Here is the mindset we should have: That was part of my old life! I am a new creation in Christ! To live a holy life, to separate ourselves from sin, we must see ourselves as God doesâ€”as born-again children of the Most High, clothed with the righteousness of Christ. We also have the benefit of being part of the Body of Christ. Fellowship with other Christians and making ourselves accountable to them is a great source of strength in living a holy life. As Christians, we are called to encourage one another in this matter Hebrews It is also important to not give up when we mess up. When we fail, our response should be to confess the sin and keep moving forward in our Christian walk 1 John 1:
