Nouns What is a Noun? Of all the parts of speech, nouns are perhaps the most important. A noun is a word that identifies a person, animal, place, thing, or idea. **Identifying a Noun** A noun is a part of speech that denotes a person, animal, place, thing, or idea. As you read the following explanations, think about some words that might fit into each category. **Person** A term for a person, whether proper name, gender, title, or class, is a noun. **Animal** A term for an animal, whether proper name, species, gender, or class is a noun. **Place** A term for a place, whether proper name, physical location, or general locale is a noun. **Thing** A term for a thing, whether it exists now, will exist, or existed in the past is a noun. **Idea** A term for an idea, be it a real, workable idea or a fantasy that might never come to fruition is a noun. **Noun Examples** When we first start to learn the parts of speech, trying to identify different words can seem like a challenge. This process gets easier with practice. Here are some noun examples to help you get started. The nouns in each sentence have been italicized. **Person** He is the person to see. **Person** John started to run. **Person** Plato was an influential Greek philosopher. **Person** Sharon admires her grandfather. **Person** My mother looks a lot like my grandmother, and I look very much like them. **Animal** The dog barked at the cat. **Animal** Elephants never forget. **Animal** Sophie is my favorite horse. **Place** The restaurant is open. **Place** Look over there. **Place** Harvard and Yale are two famous universities. **Thing** Please close the door and lock it. **Thing** Use words properly to be understood. **Thing** The lamp sits on a table next to the sofa. **Idea** The theory of relativity is an important concept. **Idea** Love is a wonderful emotion. **How Nouns Function** Nouns have several important functions. Every sentence has a subject, which is a noun that tells us what that sentence is all about. John swung the baseball bat. Nouns are direct objects. These nouns receive action from verbs. Nouns are indirect objects. These nouns receive the direct object. Brad threw John the ball. Nouns are objects of prepositions. These nouns follow the prepositions in prepositional phrases. John swung the baseball bat at Greg. Nouns are predicate nominatives. These nouns follow linking verbs and rename the subject. John is a baseball player. Nouns are object complements. These nouns complete the direct object. They named their dog Max. This is just the beginning. Before you look at the list of nouns, I'd like to point out that each noun fits into more than one of the categories below. For example, the word train is a common, concrete, countable, singular noun.

Common Nouns name people, places, or things that are not specific. Did you know that nouns perform many different jobs in our sentences? Are you wondering what a sentence diagram is? Sentence diagramming is a visual way to show how the words in a sentence are related to each other. Since nouns can do many things in a sentence, the way they are diagrammed depends on the way that they are acting in each sentence. Nouns can be subjects. Subjects tell us whom or what a sentence is about. The students happily studied grammar. Nouns can be direct objects. Direct objects receive the action of transitive active verbs. Nouns can be indirect objects. Indirect objects tell us to whom or for whom the action of the verb is done. They taught their friends grammar. Nouns can be objects of prepositions. Objects of prepositions are nouns that come after prepositions in prepositional phrases. Their friends smiled with glee. Nouns can be predicate nouns. Predicate nouns are nouns that come after linking verbs. They rename the subject of the sentence. They were grammar champions! Nouns can be objective complements. Nouns can be appositives. Appositives are nouns that rename other nouns. My friend Marianne likes cupcakes.

Even though there are different kinds of nouns, a noun can fall into more than one class. An example of this would be: Kathleen dated three different Davids in college. Davids in that sentence would fall into the classes of proper, count and concrete. To further explain the kinds of nouns, you can use this guide and remember that the lists of nouns below contain all of these types: Common nouns which describe an entire group of entities examples would be the nouns village or women. Proper nouns as a general rule are capitalized in the English language. Common nouns as a general rule are not capitalized. Sometimes the same word can function as both a common noun and a proper noun, where one such entity is special. For example the common noun god refers to all deities, while the proper noun God specifically refers to the monotheistic God. Countable and Uncountable or Noncount Nouns Countable nouns are common nouns that can become a plural. They can combine with exact numbers even one, as a singular or indefinite numbers like "a" or "an". Examples from English include "indigestion" and "furniture". Collective Nouns Collective nouns name groups consisting of more than one individual or entity. The group is a single unit, but it has more than one member. Examples include "family", "committee", "corporation", "faculty", "army", and "school". Concrete Nouns and Abstract Nouns Concrete nouns refer to their ability to register on your five senses. Abstract nouns on the other hand refer to abstract objects such as ideas or concepts, like the nouns "politeness" or "hatefulness". Possessive Nouns A possessive noun is a noun that names who or what has something. The possessive form is used with nouns referring to people, groups of people, countries, and animals.
