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The civilization of Rome had been clean wiped out in that quarter of Europe. It was not until the middle of the six hundreds that men began once more to think of them. The cause of their reappearance upon the stage of European history is chronicled for us in a contemporary life of St. Amand, Bishop of Bourges. Towards the close of the year , Amand, who had journeyed to Rome, was one day praying before the tomb of the Apostles, when suddenly he heard the voice of St. Peter bidding him be up and return to Gaul, where he must preach the Gospel. So impressed was he with the reality of the warning, that he at once set out for the northern province, and presently reached Sens. Here he was told that there was a country beyond the Scheldt called Gand, where dwelt a wild people who had forgotten God, and who worshipped trees, and that so rude was this land, and so fierce were its inhabitants, that no missionary had hitherto ventured there. This must be the field, said Amand, which St. Peter would have me till, and with a small band of companions he landed on the further bank of the Scheldt. The reception the new comers met with was not one calculated to inspire confidence. This so terrified his companions that they, all of them, drew back in fear of their lives. But Amand, nothing daunted, went on with the work he had undertaken, and in course of time won the confidence of the natives, many of whom he baptized. For thirty years he wandered up and down this forlorn district, enduring all manner of hardships, preaching and teaching wherever he went. Presently he was joined by other missionaries. Here and there churches and monasteries were built. The land around soon began once more to be brought under cultivation, and, beneath the shelter of their walls, villages and little towns gradually sprung up. Omer, Thorhout, Tronchienne, each of them claims as its founder one or other of the missionaries who at this time were evangelizing the country; and at Bruges they still show the rude chapel on the banks of the Roya in which St. Amand baptized his first neophytes. It was not, however, to this remnant of resuscitated Celts that the Netherlands owed the important part they played later on in the civilization of Europe. How or when the first Flemings came here are subjects wrapt in mystery. Perhaps the same upheaval which, in the middle of the four hundreds, drove our own Saxon forefathers from their old homes in Jutland and Friesland and Sleswicke-Holstein to seek new homes in Britain, impelled also the Saxon Flemings to the northern shore of Gaul. Be this as it may, all along the coast line of the Netherlands were scattered, at a very early date, settlements of men of Saxon origin, of this there can be no doubt, who possessed in a very marked degree the qualities and characteristics of their race. They were chaste, proud, daring, avaricious, given to plunder. Mutual responsibility was the basis of their social system; the Karl, or free land-holder, the pivot on which hinged their entire political organization. Like all Saxons, they had a horror of slavery. Courage for them was the queen of virtues; freedom dearer than life; vengeance but the cultus of filial piety, and family ties the most sacred of all. These were the dominant tones which coloured all their institutions. At the uproarious banquets at which in Flanders, as elsewhere, the Karls assembled to deliberate on public affairs, to choose their leaders, and deposit in a common hoard the gulden destined for an insurance fund in case of shipwreck, fire or storm, the first goblet drained was in honour of Woden, for victory, and the last to the memory of those heroes who had fallen on the battlefield. When, after the carnage of Fontanet A. Again and again the feudal lords endeavoured to reduce them to serfdom, and again and again their endeavour proved abortive. In Flanders at least they preserved their liberty, living under their own laws and their own elected chiefs; a nation of free men, practically independent of the sovereigns who nominally ruled over them, until, at all events, the advent of the House of Burgundy. His coming was in this wise. The Danes were everywhere harrying Neustria, and the old Frank king, Charles the Bald, unable to purchase peace by the strength of his own arm, was buying it at the best markets he could, with gold and concessions. In days when a mighty hand and an outstretched arm

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alone could lead to fortune, his reputation for strength of will and thew was of far greater importance. This man, then, it were politic to bind to the crumbling fortunes of the royal house, so thought Guntfried and Gosfried, in all singleness of heart, and at their instigation King Charles the Bald consented to receive his homage, little thinking that he was thereby laying the foundations of a house which would one day wreck his dynasty. But the new vassal was something more than a strong man, he was a man, too, of tact and address, and his influence soon became so great, and the favours showered on him so large, that Guntfried and Gosfried, jealous of the rival whom they themselves had set up, determined to compass his overthrow. To this end, supported by Louis, son of Charles the Bald, and by Judith, his beautiful and accomplished daughter, they called to their assistance the Flemish chief, Baldwin, son of Odoaker, a man of whose antecedents we know nothing. Judith was at this time one of the most remarkable women in Europe. Her career had been a strange and a stormy one. First married, in his old age and as his second wife, to our own King Ethelwolf of Wessex, it was to Judith, his step-mother, that Alfred the Great was indebted for his earliest training. When Ethelwolf died she had contracted an alliance with Ethelbald, a son of the old king by a former marriage, and upon his death in she retired to Senlis, where she was living in queenly state under the sovereign protection of its bishops when Baldwin saw her, became enamoured of her beauty, and it would seem, with her own connivance, carried her off for his bride. Summoning the nobles of his Court to his presence forthwith, he pronounced judgment against the culprits in accordance with civil law, next obtained from his complaisant bishops their excommunication, and marching in person against the two conspiring vassals, surprised them at Meaux, and forced them to lay down their arms. The plot then had for the moment failed. Nor did they seek in vain. See to it, then, that you do not bring down upon your head disasters yet more terrible. Have sufficient good sense to master your spleen, and be not for ever deaf to Baldwin. On the 25th of October, he received Judith at his palace at Verberie, and shortly afterwards her union with Baldwin was celebrated with great splendour at Auxerre. But though Charles had consented to acknowledge the marriage, no argument could induce him to be present at the ceremony by which it was made legal. The first was the founder of the royal house of France, the second the ancestor to whom all the Counts of Flanders traced their descent. Hard-by on the mainland, near the spot where the rivers met, stood a small, ancient sanctuary, which tradition said St. Amand had built, and further up stream, on the banks of the Boterbeke, a larger church dedicated to the Saviour, and said to be the handiwork of St. This place, perhaps from the brugge or heather which surrounded it, perhaps from the brigge or bridge by which it was approached, was called Brugge or Bruggestock or Bruggeswelle—a lonely, desolate place hemmed in by forest and marsh, and, from the nature of its site, well calculated to form a stronghold against the Danes. Moved by this consideration, hither came Baldwin and Judith when they had made their peace with the irascible King Charles, determined to make Brugge the headquarters of their government and their principal abode. Thanks to it, we shall see the tumbled-down ruins of Bruggestock develop later on into that wondrous conglomeration of picturesque civic splendour—rival, in its heyday, of Venice, alike in commerce and in treasures of art, and in glory of piled-up brick, which later generations called Bruges, the Queen of the North. The old fortress which he found there was built on an oblong-shaped island. The river Roya, which enclosed it on two sides those facing S. Soon, however, after the bend of the stream, the Roya now burrows underground, vaulted over in the seventeenth century, and wends its subterranean course along the south-west side of the Place du Bourg, under Government House, and at the back of the houses which line the east side of the rue Flamande, and comes once more into daylight just opposite the old Academy in the Place des Biscayens. As to the Boterbeke—the stream which formed the north-west boundary of the old Bourg, its course has long since been diverted, and it now only skirts the city. It formerly entered Bruges beyond the station, near the spot where the old Bouverie gate stood forty years ago, crept along near the cathedral, down the rue du Vieux Bourg, beneath the Belfry, built on piles thrust into its bed, and finally mingled its waters with those of the Roya at the corner of the rue Breidal. Of the actual buildings which Baldwin found at Brugge, it is doubtful whether any remain. Possibly the Baptistry Chapel, in the rear of the Chapel of St. Basil, is of the date which tradition claims for it, and, if so, it may perhaps be

identified with St. Basil dates from the same epoch as the rest of the building, and that Baldwin, Bras de Fer, was himself its founder. The old Bourg itself had fallen into such a state of decay when Baldwin first came to Bruges, that he did not dare deposit there the relics of St. Donatian which had been given to him by Archbishop Ebber of Rheims, but sent them for safe keeping to his castle at Thorhout, about three leagues south of Bruges, until the new bourg which he was building should be ready to receive them. The old fortress was never restored, but its stones were used later on during the reign of Baldwin II. Running on in a straight line past the fish market, it now empties itself into the grand coupure, and is one of the most picturesque waterways in Bruges. Behind them soar the high-pitched roofs and dormer windows of an old city hall, whose pinnacles and turrets and spires give play to light and shade, and break up the sky line. Hard-by, at the end of a narrow street which runs back from the water, behold a rival of the Bridge of Sighs, and in a gilded gatehouse without gates, the marriage of the Middle Age and the Renaissance, and to the right, quaint, venerable and picturesque in weather-beaten brick, the Palace of the Liberty of Bruges, and further still, a vista of old homes, and shady lawns, and overhanging trees and bridges, hunch-backed and of ancient date. Donatian, and further on the cloisters of the priests who served it. Such was the citadel reared on the banks of the Roya by the father and founder of Bruges. Of his handiwork only a fragment has come down to us, but a fragment so perfect, that as one enters the gloomy crypt beneath the Chapel of the Precious Blood, the mind is involuntarily carried back to the time when Baldwin and his family worshipped there, a thousand years ago. Bertin, there in the quiet of its cloister to gather up his strength for the last great battle. So, too, was it during the days of the second Baldwin, but the mantle of the old Marquis had not fallen on his son. The hard head and iron will and iron hand of Baldwin, Bras de Fer, was not the heritage of Baldwin the Bald, and the wild courage of the Karls of the seaboard, who had to bear the brunt of the battle whilst their panic-stricken chief was safely entrenched in his fortress at Bruges, could do little more than stem the tide. Why dwell on the woes of Neustria, laments Adroald, a monk of Fleury, why dwell on the woes of Neustria? From the shore of the ocean right away to Auvergne there is no country which has preserved its freedom, no city, no village but has been overwhelmed by the devastating fury of these Pagans, and this has been going on for thirty years. In the year , on the left bank of the Roya, a little higher up stream than the old bourg, the citizens of Bruges built for themselves a chapel, and dedicated it to St. Hilarius—a sufficiently humble structure, knit together like so many churches in the eight hundreds, of rudely-hewn beams and rough planks. From this grain of mustard seed in after ages there sprang up a tree that is still the glory of Bruges—a stately shrine, adorned by a steeple, than which, in its grand simplicity, there is not one perhaps more lovely in the world. The circumstances which led to his interment there are sufficiently curious. They had at first laid him alongside his father at St. But Baldwin meanwhile had got wind of the plot, had set his house in order, had strengthened his border towns. Rolf refused to exchange the land which his sword had won for a less advantageous holding, which perhaps he might never obtain, and the famous treaty of Claire-sur-Epte was the outcome of his common sense. And though to the cynical Norman chief his oath of fealty may have been little more than an empty form, and his change of religion but a move in the game, the signing of the treaty of Claire-sur-Epte was, for Neustria, the first streak of dawn. It was chiefly in the reorganization of the Church in Flanders, and, in the first place, of the great religious houses, that Arnulph sought to accomplish the object he had in view. Though the Church had suffered much at the hands of the Danes, monasticism was not, at this time, at such a low ebb in Flanders as it was in England in the days of Alfred. In England it was practically extinct, in Flanders it had only languished. She it was who first tended the dying flame. The good work was completed by her son Arnulph, who, in this matter, played much the same part in his own dominions as that played in England by King Edred, his first cousin. He was the builder or restorer of eighteen great monasteries. The famous Chapter of St. Donatian at Bruges was founded and munificently endowed by him. The Collegiate Church of St. Mary at Ardenburg, and the Collegiate Church of St. Peter at Thorhout, were each of them his handiwork, and a host of minor foundations bear witness to his untiring energy and zeal. He was the friend and patron of St. Gerard, the thaumaturgus of Brogne, and through him he reformed more than one religious house.

Transcription services for the Workshop were provided by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration. The workshop was prompted by the concern of government agencies over environmental damage resulting from present day cadmium electroplating processes. Cadmium electroplating and stripping operations are responsible for as much as fifty percent of the industrial discharges of cadmium to water in the United States. Cadmium that reaches drinking water supplies, navigable waters, and food chains is hazardous to humans. The purpose of the workshop was to examine techniques and alternatives to minimize the loss of cadmium into the environment by applying cadmium by mechanisms that reduce the loss of cadmium during plating and by developing suitable and cost-effective alternative materials, methods, and coatings that can be utilized where possible in the design and manufacture of items that are now characteristically electroplated with cadmium. A secondary purpose of the workshop was to develop a model of a technical forum in which government and industry representatives could discuss a wide spectrum of issues concerning the use of and alternatives for industrial materials suspected of being hazardous to health and the environment. Similar workshops concerning other materials might be organized in the future by agencies responsible for regulating the use of toxic substances. The concept adopted by the steering committee was to divide the workshop into two sessions. The first session concentrated on presentations reporting the efficacy of individual alternative materials and processes for electrodeposited cadmium. The second session dealt with the presentation of laboratory and field trials comparing a number of the alternatives described during the first session. Interspersed throughout these presentations were a number of papers on closely related areas, including the development of environmentally compatible processes for electroplating cadmium, the importance of electrodeposited cadmium coatings, and the environmental and health effects of cadmium. In addition to presentations, two panel sessions were held. The first panel addressed the question, "Are specifications and standards barriers to change? They extemporaneously discussed problems and issues related to the identification, testing, qualification, documentation, and application of alternative materials and processes for electrodeposited cadmium. The second panel addressed the question, "How essential is electrodeposited cadmium? They discussed technical, economic, environmental, and health issues germane to the production and use of electrodeposited cadmium. This document presents the proceedings of the workshop, including an edited transcript of the dialogue from question and answer periods following each presentation and from each discussion panel. The workshop proceedings will be used by participating agencies in their efforts to assess the various approaches to minimizing loss of cadmium to the environment. The information presented during this workshop is of timely importance, not only to the government, but to the industrial community as well. To avoid delays in the dissemination of this information, this report has been produced directly from statements submitted by the participants for publication. Some of be very to take you may be visiting the Bureau for the first time, and may not familiar with what we do here. I thought it would be worthwhile a few minutes to tell you something about the Bureau. The Bureau was established in and it was meant to function as the National Measurement Laboratory with responsibilities for developing national standards, improved and new methods of measurement in the field in engineering and science, and to provide a focal point in the United States Government for standardization activities. In the Bureau of Standards was reorganized into its current structure. It consists of

four major organizational units, or institutes. There is also an Institute for Applied Technology which provides technical services to promote the use of available technology and to facilitate technological innovation in industry and government; cooperates with public and private organizations leading to the development of technological standards including safety standards and codes and methods of test; provides technical advice and services to government agencies upon request; monitors NBS engineering standards activities, and provides liaison between NBS and national and international engineering standards bodies; and carries out programs falling into three broad categories: The Institute for Computer Science and Technology has the responsibility for the standardization of hardware and software in the computer field, particularly with respect to purchases by the Federal Government. The Institute for Materials Research, which is a co-sponsor of this meeting, has as its mission the assistance and stimulation of industry in the development of new and improved products and the full utilization of existing products through increased understanding of basic properties of materials. The Institute develops, produces, and distributes standard reference materials for the calibration of instruments and equipment, the comparison of measurements on materials, and for assistance in the control of production processes in industry and in Laboratories 1 that are of direct benefit to the general public, e. In recent years, we in IMR have focussed on a number of national one of which is the general problem that you are here to discuss morning. I will touch on that briefly in a moment. We have a major program in failure analysis how and why do things fail trying to predict the performance of materials so that materials can be properly used in design and then maintained properly. We are concerned with clinical chemistry measurements, and measurement and standards matters related to health. For example, we have a major program in developing referee or definitive tests to make the clinical analyses that are performed by approximately 15, clinical laboratories in this country more accurate and meaningful. Last year there were about 5 billion clinical measurements made in the United States. We are also providing standard reference materials for calibrating instruments and measurement methods so that analytical results can be compared from one laboratory to another. We are concerned with accurate measurements for air and water pollution. While we are not responsible for the regulatory aspects of the environment, we are concerned with providing accurate methodology and standards for the analysis of particulates, trace metals, organics, and some of the gases which are found in the environment. These methods, can then, be adapted by the Environmental Protection Agency for some of their monitoring activities and are available for industry use. One of the problems that we have been concerned with over the last three years in this latter program has been the analysis of toxic metals in the environment. We have been particularly concerned with the chemistry of heavy metals in the Chesapeake Bay. We have published a number of papers describing the chemical transformations involving mercury and other heavy metals that occur in the sediment of Chesapeake Bay; specifically, those reactions involving strains of pseudomonas bacteria and traces of tin which result in the transformation of non-toxic inorganic mercury to methylated organic mercury. We share your concern about heavy metals finding their way into the environment. It is an important health effects problem, and we need to understand the reaction mechanisms involving heavy metals which lead to toxic compounds. There is also a question of the conservation of cadmium as a strategic and critical material. To conclude with a brief comment on electrodeposition efforts, NBS has been active in this field since As many of you may know, NBS scientists invented several forms of electrodeposition, including electroless nickel. The staff concerned with electrodeposition at NES over the years has published more than technical reports, including the mechanical properties and the corrosion characteristics of some of the electrodeposited materials. We have a strong interest in the subject that you are due to discuss here and we will be following the discussions with keen interest. I want to thank those of you from industry, from the academic world, and from Federal agencies for being here this morning and for your thoughtful papers. Without that support, this workshop would not be possible. I represent the Department of Defense in the areas of energy, environment and safety. The Department of Defense is vitally concerned with each of those issues. In the energy area, we are working with the newly formed Department of Energy, which was created last Saturday. Hopefully, one issue during this

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conference will be the recognition that energy is a problem and, as we are looking at alternative processes and substitutes, the question of energy should be considered. I also represent the Department in areas of occupational safety and health. We are a very large employer, employing about 3 million people. These employees deserve a healthful working place, and my responsibility is to try to provide that under such laws as the Occupational Safety and Health Act. Without going into occupational safety and health say that all employers today have a major problem work place. Finklea of NIOSH announced that they had surveyed a large population of employers, including a high percentage of those who employed more than people, and had found that one out of every four employees was subjected to hazardous materials and other hazards which would be injurious to their health. Our mutual concerns with safety and occupational health are among the reasons we are here today. This issue will relate to the output of this workshop. I am concerned with and represent DoD in the area of environmental protection. We are, of course, doing the best we can in air pollution, water pollution, safe drinking water, radiation, solid waste management and the myriad of such laws that affect our day-to-day operations in the Department of Defense. It is not unusual at all, therefore, for the Department of Defense to be a co-sponsor of this workshop. We became interested in cadmium more than two years ago, and this workshop is a direct result of our interest. The bulk of the credit for bringing this about belongs to Mr. Ed Dyckman, who works for the Department of Defense. In any event, the Department of Defense has addressed cadmium uses, alternative processes, and possible substitutes for several years. I would like to say that the Defense Department does not have any preconceived notions as to the future of cadmium. There may be many of you here today who will say: It is absolutely essential, and all we have to do is improve plating processes from an environmental protection point of view. I am not standing up here taking any side, and I am hopefully exploring alternatives and all aspects of this issue. The DoD placed special interest on our cadmium uses in early , primarily due to some outside pressure from an environmental group. The environmental group became concerned with heavy metals from the Philadelphia sludge that was being ocean-dumped, which you still can read about today. The environmental group knew that there was a high concentration of heavy metals in the sludge and selected cadmium as an example. They started asking questions such as "How did cadmium get there to begin with? This brought me into the problem in a hurry. This pressure was most helpful. It caused us to study cadmium comprehensively, and it caused us to look at our use of it in the Department of Defense, specification by specification. The truth is that we consume, or cause industry to consume, about 5. The bulk of cadmium is used, as you know, in electroplating, and of that, the DoD is responsible for consuming less than seven percent of the total. Therefore, we do not wish to continue to carry the total burden on us from the environmental groups. That is why we are thankful for you being here today, to help us carry that burden. As we began to study our usage of cadmium from several points of view, the primary concern was to protect public health and welfare, as dictated by the 6 laws concerning safety, occupational health, and such as the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, B, and the Toxic Substances Control Act. Environmental Protection Agency in the area of cadmium. We carried out that cooperative effort over the past two and a half years, and this workshop is evidence that it is going well. Thirdly, we are always interested in improving our materials processes and, therefore, we initiated our own study to identify alternatives for cadmium.

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The guards can find nothing. It is always empty. If there is a unifying thesis that runs through the bric-a-brac of reflections on violence that follow, it is that a similar paradox holds true for violence. At the forefront of our minds, the obvious signals of violence are acts of crime and terror, civil unrest, international conflict. This is the starting point, perhaps even the axiom, of the present book: The catch is that subjective and objective violence cannot be perceived from the same standpoint: It is seen as a perturbation of the "normal," peaceful state of things. Objective violence is invisible since it sustains the very zero-level standard against which we perceive something as subjectively violent. It should have stuck to the list of usual suspects: The Congo today has effectively re-emerged as a Conradian "heart of darkness. Do we need further proof that the humanitarian sense of urgency is mediated, indeed overdetermined, by clear political considerations? And what are these considerations? To answer this, we need to step back and take a look from a different position. There are reasons for looking at the problem of violence awry. Yet there is a sense in which a cold analysis of violence somehow reproduces and participates in its horror. The problem here is part of the solution: That is to say, when Adorno declares poetry impossible or, rather, barbaric after Auschwitz, this impossibility is an enabling impossibility: There may well be some truth in the common wisdom that, in a kind of historical premonition, the music of Schoenberg articulated the anxieties and nightmares of Auschwitz before the event took place. In her memoirs, Anna Akhmatova describes what happened to her when, at the height of the Stalinist purges, she was waiting in the long queue in front of the Leningrad prison to learn about her arrested son Lev: One day somebody in the crowd identified me. Standing behind me was a young woman, with lips blue from the cold, who had of course never heard me called by name before. Now she started out of the torpor common to us all and asked me in a whisper everyone whispered there, "Can you describe this? This is not a description which locates its content in a historical space and time, but a description which creates, as the background of the phenomena it describes, an inexistent virtual space of its own, so that what is VIOLENCE appears in it is not an appearance sustained by the depth of reality behind it, but a decontextualised appearance, an appearance which fully coincides with real being. To quote Stevens again: He evoked the way this terror affects subjectivity. Underlying all this is a hypocritical sentiment of moral outrage. There is a fundamental anti-theoretical edge to these urgent injunctions. There is no time to reflect: Through this fake sense of urgency, the. As Bill Gates recently put it: Just sit and wait? Engagement seems to exert its pressure on us from all directions. The young man needs to make a decision grounded only in his own abyssal freedom and assume full responsibility for it. There is more than cheap cynicism in this advice. It brings to mind a well-known Soviet joke about Lenin. As expected, Marx, rather conservative in private matters, answers, "A wife! And this is what we should do today when we find ourselves bombarded with mediatic images of violence. We need to "learn, learn, and learn" what causes this violence. They left Russia for Germany on a boat known as the Philosophy Steamer. Prior to his expulsion, Nikolai Lossky, one of those forced into exile, had enjoyed with his family the comfortable life of the haute bourgeoisie, supported by servants and nannies. What had the Losskys and their kind done? His boys and their friends, as they inherited the best of what Russia had to offer, helped fill the world with talk of literature and music and art, and they led gentle lives. What was wrong with that? The day Andrei Lossky was born, in May, the family could hear the sound of riderless horses galloping down neighboring Ivanovskaya Street. It is this violence which seems to arise "out of nowhere" that, perhaps, fits what Walter Benjamin, in his "Critique of Violence," called pure, divine violence. An SOS call sustains such talk, drowning out all other approaches: There he saw Guernica and, shocked at the modernist "chaos" of the painting, asked Picasso: Is this what you want? This is the true result of your politics! The surprised wife exclaims: We see a lot of ecological decay and human misery. Is this not

truer than ever today? An exemplary case of this interdependence is provided by Etienne Balibar, who distinguishes two opposite but complementary modes of excessive violence: Responsibility for communist crimes is easy to allocate: We can even identify the ideological sources of the crimes-totalitarian ideology, The Communist Manifesto, Rousseau, even Plato. All this seems just to have happened as the result of an "objective" process, which nobody planned and executed and for which there was no "Capitalist Manifesto. The country was his personal fiefdom! The ultimate irony is that even most of the profits from this endeavour were for the benefit of the Belgian people, for public works, museums, and so on. Davos, an exclusive Swiss resort, is where the global elite of managers, statesmen, and media personalities meet under heavy police protection, in conditions of a state of siege, and try to convince us and themselves that globalisation is its own best remedy. We hear less and less of them. Where have the bright stars of Porto Alegre gone? Some of them, at least, went to Davos. Their claim is that we can have the global capitalist cake, i. The new liberal communists are, of course, our usual suspects: What makes this group interesting is that their ideology has become all but indistinguishable from the new breed of anti-globalist leftist radicals: Toni Negri himself, the guru of the postmodern left, praises digital capitalism as containing in nuce all the elements of communism-one has only to drop the capitalist form, and the revolutionary goal is achieved. The signifier of this new reality in the liberal communist Newspeak is "smart": In the new company headquarters, there is little external discipline. A crucial feature of Gates as icon is that he is perceived as the ex-hacker who made it. Hackers want to disturb the smooth functioning of large bureaucratic corporations. Liberal communists are big executives recuperating the spirit of contest, or, to put it the other way round, counter-cultural geeks who take over big corporations. Give everything away for free free access, no copyright.. Be caring, sharing, and aware of social responsibility. Endorse and practise the cult of transparency, the free flow of information, all humanity should collaborate and interact. Just engage in improvised smart, dynamic, flexible communications. Go back to school and engage in permanent education. Act as an enzyme: Stand in for the state: Liberal communists are pragmatic. For them there is no single exploited working class today. There are only concrete problems to be solved: Instead, all of us should just concentrate on what really does the work of solving the problem: Liberal communists like examples such as the struggle against apartheid in South Africa. The self-same companies can now thrive in post-apartheid South Africa. Liberal communists also love the student protests which shattered France in May How it shattered the confines of the rigid bureaucratic order! After all, many of them were young then, protesting and fighting cops on the streets. And would Marx not have said today: Above all, liberal communists are true citizens of the world. They are good people who worry. They worry about populist fundamentalists and irresponsible, greedy capitalist corporations. The catch, of course, is that in order to give, first you have to take-or, as some would put it, create. So if the state wants to regulate their business, to tax them excessively, is it aware that in this way it is effectively undermining the stated goal of its activity -that is, to make life better for the large majority, to really help those in need? Liberal communists do not want to be just machines for generating profits. They want their lives to have a deeper meaning. Everybody knows that Buddhism foreshadows the brain sciences, that the power of meditation can be measured scientifically! Their preferred motto is social responsibility and gratitude: After all, what is the point of their success, if not to help people? We need to ask ourselves whether there really is something new here.

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I have hitherto had much reason to rejoice in the progress of your studies; and when you return from viewing foreign cities and manners, I shall hope to see you struggling to confer benefits on your country, while you lay the foundation for a lasting reputation for yourself. Stratheden House, April 10, WHEN suddenly freed, in the autumn of , from professional and official occupations, I revelled for a while in the resumption of my classical studies, and in the miscellaneous perusal of modern authors. By degrees I began to perceive the want of a definite object: I recollected what Lord Coke and Lord Bacon say of the debt due from every successful lawyer to his profession; and I felt within me a revival of the aspiration after literary fame, which, in my most busy days, I was never able entirely to extinguish. But LIVES, if they be well written, propounding to themselves a person to represent, in whom actions both greater and smaller, public and private, have a commixture, must of necessity contain a more true, native, and lively representation. It has existed from the foundation of the monarchy; and although mediocrity has sometimes been the recommendation for it, generally speaking, the most eminent men of the age, if not the most virtuous, have been selected to adorn it. To an English statesman as well as an English lawyer the narrative ought to be particularly instructive, for the history of the holders of the Great Seal is the history of our constitution as well as of our jurisprudence. There is even a sort of romance belonging to the true tale of many of those who are to be delineated, and the strange vicissitudes of their career are not exceeded by the fictions of novelists or dramatists. I foresaw the difficulties that would beset me-sometimes from the want, and sometimes from the superfluity of materials. Struggling with these, I have attempted to present to the reader a clear and authentic account of all who have held the Great Seal of England from the earliest times-adapting the scale of my narrative to the varying importance of what is to be told, and trying as I proceed to give a glimpse of the most important historical events, and of the manners of the age. If I have failed, it will not have been for the want of generous assistance. I wish to speak with the most heartfelt gratitude of the kindness which I have experienced. I have been treated like a shipwrecked mariner cast on a friendly shore every one eagerly desirous to comfort and to cherish him. In not one single instance since I entered on the undertaking, when I have applied for assistance, have I met with a rebuff; on the contrary, the most eager and disinterested disposition has been evinced to oblige me. Such good offices I have to boast of, not less from political opponents than from political associates, and my thanks are peculiarly due to many clergymen of the Church of England to whom I was personally unknown, and who have devoted much time and trouble in furnishing me with extracts from parish registers, copies of epitaphs, and other local information. Duffus Hardy, for many important writs, proclamations, and letters never before published, which he has discovered for me in the Tower of London; - to Sir Francis Palgrave, acquaint. Payne Collier, the learned Editor of Shakespeare, for various ballads and handbills published at the death of Lord Chancellor Jeffreys;- to Mr. Foss, Editor of " The Grandeur of the Law," who has amassed a noble collection respecting all English lawyers in all ages, for helping me out with dates and facts respecting some of the early Chancellors; to Mr. Spence, of the Chancery Bar, for his communication to me of a large portion of his materials for the important work in which he is engaged on the jurisdiction of the Court of Chancery; -- to Mr. Parkes, author of "The History of the Court of Chancery," for the loan of his large assortment of tracts on English jurisprudence; to Mr. Panizzi, for the good-humour and intelligence which have laid open to me all the treasures of the British Museum;- and to my friend and pupil, Mr. I shall receive very thankfully any information with which I may be favoured, either privately or in print, to enable me to correct errors and to supply omissions. I hope that I have shown myself free from any party or sectarian bias. The great principles of civil and religious liberty I ever wish boldly to avow, and resolutely to maintain; but I believe that I have fairly appreciated the acts and characters of those whose Lives

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I have had in hand, without being swayed by the consideration whether they were Roman Catholics or Protestants-Whigs or Tories. I must request the candid reader not to judge by any particular expression, or any particular Life, but by the whole scope and tendency of the work. Horace Walpole seeks to deter all who have ever touched a Great Seal from engaging in such a task, by observing, after his criticisms on the historical labours of Sir Thomas More, Lord Bacon, and Lord Clarendon, " It is hoped no more Chancellors will write our story till they can divest themselves of that habit of their profession - apologising for a bad cause. I regret the length into which I have been drawn; but, after a careful revision, I have found nothing that I could omit without injury to my design; and when due regard is had to the number of persons whose history was to be narrated, and to the multitudinous facts to be introduced, I am not without hopes that I may receive some little credit for condensation. It will be seen that this 1st " First Series" comes down to the Revolution of 1688. I was advised to begin with the Chancellors during the eighteenth century, and to travel back, after the precedent of Hume. Such a plan would have had advantages, the recent Lives being generally considered the most interesting; but as I profess to give the history of our jurisprudence, I thought that I should best succeed by starting from its sources, and following the course which it has run. Xiii I calculate that the work will be completed in two additional volumes, for which I have already made considerable preparations, and which, if my life and strength be preserved to me, I shall ere long lay before the public. Little interruption to study is offered by the political business of the House of Lords, and although I resolve still regularly to attend the hearing of Appeals and Writs of Error there, and the meetings of the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council, a considerable portion of the year is left entirely under my own control. That the " Second Series" may be less defective, I earnestly request the communication of any scarce tracts or unpublished MSS. If the work should be worthily finished, my ambition is, that it may amuse the general reader; that it may afford some instruction to those who wish to become well acquainted with our constitutional history; and above all, that it may excite the young student of the law to emulation and industry, and confirm in his mind the liberal and honourable maxims which ought ever to govern the conduct of an English Barrister. I may truly say, that within a few weeks after its publication " it was on every table, and almost on every toilette. I must especially return my thanks for the kind manner in which, without regard to politics, the book has been treated in periodical publications - quarterly, monthly, weekly, and daily. Gentlemen who have written these criticisms have done ample justice to any merits which they discovered, and have forbore to dwell upon mistakes which could not have escaped them. This edition will be found not only more correct, but enriched with several interesting documents which have recently been communicated to me, - particularly a congratulatory Epistle to John de Langton on his appointment as Chancellor by Edward I.; Richard III. I earnestly implore that errors and omissions may still be pointed out to me. These will bring down the Chancellors to the death of Lord Thurlow.
