The SAU does not dispute this comment. In fact they agree with it. Both Borst and SAU personnel agreed that more people were needed to appropriately take care of the grounds. The SAU also tried to get the voters to approve newer and better mowers, but the voters rejected this request. Unfortunately the SAU has limited resources to just add personnel. By Pelham Budget Committee mandate, all new positions must go onto a separate warrant article so Superintendent Dr. Elaine Cutler cannot just direct the Business Administrator to hire more people. It would take a warrant article and a favorable town vote. However, the SAU could spend the maintenance dollars on contracted services to expand the landscaping coverage and, according to Conrad that was what the board decided to do in the middle of winter. Borst, a seasonal employee, was not on the payroll at that time. Once Borst knew that he no longer had a job, he said that he sent a letter to all school board members, but never heard back from them. Subsequently in a non-public session, the School Board agreed to terminate the Director of Maintenance. We wanted to keep the buildings safe for the kids and ensure that appropriate maintenance was done. Gallagher was aware that he did not have total school board support for contracting the landscaping, but the contract could not be awarded without a majority support. We simply asked the contractor to consider taking on new work for the schools. Borst also asked about the bottom line cost. To date we have moved forward on the vacant position. Mohr told Chubb that the mound did not meet regulations. Gallagher said that there were a number of areas that needed improvement on the fields. Papers were on many occasions left to blow away until the snows arrived. Residents, coaches, and teacher staff have commented on the improved conditions including board members. It is lucky for all past and present patrons of the Inn that Alonzo did not leave this earth before passing along his noble genes to his sons Harry and George Harris. This second generation of dutiful members of the Harris family took over the farm, recognizing immediately that their location on the pond was prime. In , one hundred years ago, the brothers set to work and built the Inn and summer cottages. Additionally, the boys also owned an immensely successful milk business nearby on the Pelham - Methuen line. Horse drawn carriages would deliver the precious milk to the Inn and to customers all over town. In a story that exemplifies what the Harris family is all about; one milk customer with eight children was unable to keep up payment to the Harris family business. According to Harris, it was constructed so competently that it never gathers frost beneath it even on the coldest of winter days. Eventually, the milk business was lost to a fire, but the Inn continues to stand strong. Many a weary traveler called the Inn and its cottages home over the last years, even if their stay was a brief one, for everyone was welcomed warmly and made to feel like part of the family. Cottages were rented out for the summer, and some would come from as far away as New York and Pennsylvania. Businessmen would be able to bring their whole families with them. They would work in Boston during the week, and be able to spend time with their wives and children at the Inn on weekends. Promoting family was always a priority at the Inn. Since travel was not easy in those days, guests of the Inn arrived in Methuen by electric car and a covered wagon driver would pick up the travelers and bring them to the Inn. Some would stay for a week, while others would remain at the Inn for the entire summer until Labor

Day. In the early s, the summer resort business began to see a slowdown. Travel was becoming easier, and hotels and motels were cropping up. The upstairs rooms at the Inn were no longer used for extended guest stays, but began to fill up with storage. It was in that the larger upstairs room was added to the Inn. It is well suited to guide our thoughts when we are so near the day which celebrates the birth of our Lord, because it speaks of the peculiar conditions under which Christ was born. He was sent in the fulness of time, he was born of a woman, he was born under the law. Here are the human and earthly conditions into which Christ entered. He was sent and so sent that he might redeem them which were under the law, that we might receive the adoption of sons. Here is the object of his coming, our redemption from sin and our development in a new life. A Christmas Sermon I. God Sent Forth His Son. A Christmas Sermon I dwell but a moment, fruitful though the thought is, upon the statement that God sent forth his Son. The sacred historians, beginning their accounts of Jesus with his birth, are careful to describe first of all the supernatural aspects of it. We have the songs of angels proclaiming that this is Christ the Lord, before we are conducted to the stable where the new born infant lies; we first hear what the angel Gabriel says to Mary the mother, that we may know who is born in the city of David. A Christmas Sermon "We behold the star which guides the wise men from a far country to Bethlehem, a token given by God to direct them to the infant King who was sent by God and whom they fell down and worshipped. The starting point of all our knowledge of Jesus from which alone we can comprehend the human and finite conditions of his life, is the fact that he is truly divine, that such a being was in the world to bear its burdens and suffer for its sins, because God sent forth his Son. From this vantage ground of knowledge the apostle directs us to certain remarkable conditions into which the Saviour was sent, conditions which pertain to the temporal and human life of Christ, and which throw additional light on the meaning of his mission. A Christmas Sermon II. When the Fulness of the Time Was Come. A Christmas Sermon We are told that Jesus appeared at precisely the right point of time in the history of the world, not too soon before the world was made ready, not too late when the fitting period had passed by. But when the fulness of the time came God sent forth his Son. It is an interesting study to trace the various movements and tendencies in the history of the nations, which reached their culmination at the beginning of the Christian era, and which indicated the ripeness of the world for divine redemption. The Roman Empire had extended its borders far and wide, until nearly all the kingdoms of the known world had become its tributary provinces. Highways had been opened from one metropolis to another, that the armies of Rome might be speedily transferred from point to point, and these military roads became also the arteries of commercial intercourse, and of extensive travel. A Christmas Sermon By these and various other improvements many of the barriers which had separated the nations were broken down. All roads led to Rome. Common interests bound the peoples together. Gentiles, Jews, Arabians and Romans jostled each other in the streets of the capital, and traded with each other in the open marts of the chief cities. Scholars and artists of every province entered into friendly competition. In a thousand ways, cosmopolitan took the place of provincial tendencies. The different parts of the world became mutually acquainted. Thus the way was opened for the gospel to spread abroad even while Jesus was alive. Greeks were in Jerusalem desiring to see him. One of his twelve disciples had a Greek name, Philip. Simon, the son of Jonas, received from his hand a Greek appellation and

became Peter, the little rock, who followed the big rock on which the church was founded. Roman soldiers were familiar objects in Jerusalem. Jesus was tried before a Roman governor. The inscription on the cross was written in Hebrew, and Greek, and Latin, because the population had become so mixed that people speaking these various tongues were in the multitude that surged up to the very foot of the cross. A Christmas Sermon The first proclamations of the gospel spread rapidly through the consolidated empire as they could not have done a thousand or even a hundred years before. Then when we look beneath the surface of outward political conditions to tendencies of thought, we find that Jesus was born at a time when the intellect and heart of the world were ready to receive him. We are permitted in holy scripture to trace clearly the education of the Jews up to the point when their law and ritual had become inadequate, and they were hungry for some higher revelation. The last book of the Old Testament describes the emptiness of accustomed forms, and is a cry for the new messenger God will send. A Christmas Sermon Through the intervening four hundred years dissatisfaction had deepened till all eyes were turned toward the expected dawning of a better day. Some of the arguments of the Epistles prove that Judaism was a preparation for the gospel, a schoolmaster to lead to Christ. But among all the nations the way had been preparing for the coming of the Redeemer. Rome at that time was as sceptical as she was powerful. Loyalty to the ancient gods had been practically forsworn. The entire system of worship was acknowledged to be an empty shell. Priests made grimaces at each other in derision of the religious rites they practised. Statesmen defended the national forms of worship, only because they were impressive to the common people. It was not unusual in the plays performed at the theatres to caricature the popular religion while the crowd of spectators relished the humor of it. In a word, the ancient religion was utterly breaking down in the light of advancing knowledge, and the way was thus prepared for Christianity. A Christmas Sermon In Greece, philosophy had so undermined the supports of religion that sacrifices were offered only from the force of custom, or the veneration of what was ancient. The drift of thought was away from polytheism to belief in one God, or else to pantheism. The speculations of the schools were chiefly religious, concerning the supernatural, immortality and the soul. Beneath these changes was a turmoil of unrest. An inner conflict was raging, which some of the Persians so distinctly recognized that they formulated a theory of a double self, an inner dualism between evil and good. In this spiritual disorder or disunion, beginning to be recognized by the few and profoundly felt by the many, was a preparation for the atoning work of Christ, which brings harmony to the soul by securing reconciliation with God. A Christmas Sermon It is generally admitted that at no previous time had there been such a ferment of religious and philosophic thought, such a falling asunder of ancient beliefs, so eager a longing for new light and new life as at the precise period in history when God sent forth his Son. It was the fulness of the time; the time was filled with those tendencies and changes which prepared the world for Christ. We have some difficulty in wandering back through the centuries to that remote time when the babe was born in Bethlehem. And before he came the world wondered why he so long delayed his coming. The dreary centuries before Jesus was born were long in the passing. Those centuries were needed to prepare the world for his redemption; but he came none too soon. It would have been almost cruel to keep the world waiting longer. When the fulness of the time came, God sent forth his Son. Born of a Woman. Because Jesus was born into this world as an infant we can never lose our sense of the reality of his life upon the earth. How fully he gave himself up to the lot of humanity, how deeply he subjected himself to the sorrows and sufferings of human nature, how truly he became one with us, we can never fail to understand when we remember that he was, first of all, a helpless infant; that he was born of a woman. A Christmas Sermon Coming into the world by the way of a real human birth, he was so vitally identified with humanity that he could escape its limitations and woes only by the disruption of death. Being in with us he must go on in a truly human life till death should come to separate the spirit from the body. A mother, bending over her young child, feels that the little existence there has a close relation to what is above the earth, and that God has come near her through the life of her babe. It does not seem strange to her that the Son of God could assume the form and take the soul of an infant. Where could he find a more fitting entrance into the human state than in the life of infancy? The reason is, because the innocence and purity of infancy are

A Christmas Sermon In still another respect the apostle characterizes the person of the Redeemer. He was born at the fitting juncture; he was born of a woman into a real human life, and he was also born under the law. This can mean nothing other than to designate the sphere into which Christ entered and in which his work finds its place as the moral and religious sphere. It means more than that he himself conformed to the law and fulfilled all righteousness. It means that he found us in that relation which is embodied in the demands of law; that he came to extricate us from the difficulties which surround and entangle us there; in a word, that his mission has a moral, an ethical, a religious significance; that he came to be a Redeemer and placed himself irrevocably with us in those conditions which make redemption necessary. A Christmas Sermon He was not here to explain how the universe was made, by teaching science, nor to establish a system of philosophy, but solely to readjust moral and spiritual relations; to clear the way to a holy life by removing the condemnation of the law. The architect chose jail. Trout declined to elaborate on his reasons for leaving South Whitehall. Trout said he was well aware of the bad publicity surrounding the Bethlehem Township office. Trout followed George Harris, a private building inspector who was hired last summer for the rest of the year, following the dismissal of Johns. Harris was considered a tough inspector, so much so that in September, a group of builders complained that Harris was harassing them, or "nitpicking things apart," according to builder Albert DeAngelis. At the September township commissioners meeting, DeAngelis said he believed local contractors were "paying the price" for the reported problems in the inspection department. The vast majority of them are excellent. Other times, the families are just impatient. Whatever the situation, Trout, who has been involved in construction for more than 20 years, said he intends to enforce the codes equally and fairly. Violating building codes, he said, can result in criminal citations and lawsuits. For now, Trout said he is attempting to "educate" local builders on what codes are enforceable in the township. Trout said he is not demeaning builders by saying he is hoping to educate them, because the code is always evolving. Further, municipalities throughout the Lehigh Valley enforce different codes, Trout said. Although he said municipalities should update codes by ordinance, various communities in the Lehigh Valley operate under differing regulations since many communities have not been updating their codes. Some municipalities have no codes adopted at all, he added. This relates directly to an issue Trout strongly supports - adoption of a statewide building code. Adoption of such a code, as numerous states have done, would take the mystery out of building-code enforcement, he said. At least one more inspector could be hired, Trout insisted. With the township continuing to be at or near the top in terms of new development in the Lehigh Valley - Trout said he is expecting about housing starts in the township this year - inspectors will never be short of duties. And besides the half-dozen or so inspections for individual homes, the township issues permits for fences, pools, additions and alterations, which should be inspected, too.

Formerly a residential terrace of six houses, it was constructed in the mids for George Harris and was designed by architect James Cowlishaw. Over the period of the Moreton Bay penal settlement, buildings were constructed along this ridgeline, utilised by government officials for "accommodation, administration and control". At some sites such as the Commissariat Store and the City Botanic Gardens , earlier uses were continued. The establishment phase following the separation of Queensland in saw the new colonial government reserve land parcels and construct a range of buildings to facilitate its functions. The building of the first Government House and Parliament House at the eastern end of George Street in the s firmly entrenched the physical reality of a government precinct in the area. Together with a growing workforce of public servants, these politicians required accommodation when in Brisbane. From the s to the s, a range of buildings, many built by, or for politicians, were constructed to address these needs. Harris was born in London, migrated with his family to Sydney in and came to Brisbane in to work with his elder brother John. The partnership of John and George Harris, general merchants and shipping agents, was established in , with the firm involved in importing goods and exporting wool and tallow. George Harris became a well-known business and society figure in Brisbane. Immigration boosted the population dramatically more than doubling between and to over 12, and many substantial public and private buildings were constructed during this time. The permanent nature of the buildings was also partly influenced by provisions in the Municipalities Act , which required brick or stone construction and non-flammable roofing material in designated first class building areas. It is unclear if any improvements were made to the land prior to Harris purchasing the property in In Cowlishaw also designed a terrace building on the opposite corner of George and Margaret Streets for another politician, Arthur Hodgson. Essentially narrow fronted adjoining houses, terraces were built as dwellings for people across the classes, as was reflected in their respective forms, scales, materials and settings. While fairly common in mid-to-late 19th century suburbs of Sydney and Melbourne , terraces were always fewer in number in Brisbane. Those that were constructed were largely in the centre of Brisbane, or in nearby residential areas like Spring Hill and Petrie Terrace. While some terrace houses were built by property speculators as rentals in Brisbane after most notably The Mansions , these dwellings could not be sold individually. He readvertised in February , again requesting the erection of the six houses "at the risk of the former contractor". The building was advertised in December as ready for occupation from 1 January Shortly after, the building was described as, " In each of the six houses, the ground floor contained drawing and living rooms, with bedrooms on the first floor and in the attic. A slate roof with dormer windows were partly concealed by a balustraded parapet , inscribed with "Harris Terrace " at its centre. A cast iron balustrade and full length venetian blinds featured on the upper balcony. Other early tenants, Mrs Unsworth no. The houses were individually numbered and some were given their own name. From the mids some of the individual houses became boarding houses. By the s all of the houses contained in Harris Terrace were being utilised for boarding, often called "residential chambers". The Undue Subdivision of Land Prevention Act was repealed in and from this time individual titles were created for houses at Harris Court. The Lingleys retained the house on the Margaret Street corner adapting it into a cafe and building an extension to the footpath. The Royal Queensland Art Society acquired one of the houses in The shortage of office accommodation in the centre of Brisbane, and the need to address future requirements, led to a phase of governmental property acquisition in the city. The purchase of properties on George and William Streets between the Queensland Government Printing Office and Parliament House was a key focus, in addition to other acquisitions on Charlotte , Mary and Margaret streets. Harris Court was purchased around this time. Despite their varying condition and former uses, the shortage of office space saw many of these newly acquired buildings quickly adapted for government

use. In , architect John Hitch , in association with architects from the Department of Public Works , prepared plans to adapt Harris Court for government use. The original service wings and outbuildings to the rear were demolished and a new steel framed, sawtooth annexe, connected to the earlier structure was constructed, containing open plan office spaces. Original windows were removed or replaced, barrel vaulted dormers replaced with gabled dormers, and chimney and fireplace openings were bricked in. The interiors of Harris Court were also substantially altered. Three of the original six staircases were removed, and whole walls and sections of party walls were removed for full length corridors on both floor levels. A range of government offices were accommodated in the old building and annexe following the completion of works. By , a masterplan had been developed involving the demolition of all buildings between the old Executive Building and Parliament House, to enable the construction of three storey office buildings in a "plaza setting". The present day Executive Building was completed in as part of this plan. By the early s this plan for the precinct was considered no longer suitable and a number of other proposals for the area were explored. A major influence in ultimately shaping the layout of the area during the s was the growing community support for the retention of older buildings within the government precinct, especially the Bellevue Hotel and The Mansions. Spearheaded by the National Trust , the government-related associations and links between buildings, their architectural qualities, and aesthetic contributions to the area were highlighted in submissions to the government and in the public sphere. The unannounced June removal of the balconies of the Belle Vue Hotel was a deliberate action by the Queensland Government to degrade the visual appearance of the area, and drew further attention to the conservation cause. The Bellevue Hotel was to be demolished, but The Mansions and the original section of Harris Court were to be retained, renovated and adapted. On 21 April, three days after this decision, the Bellevue Hotel was demolished in the early hours of the morning, a notorious event in the history of heritage conservation in Queensland. As part of this project, renovations and major reconstructions were undertaken at Harris Terrace involving architects from the Department of Public Works in association with Conrad and Gargett Architects. Work included the reconstruction of the ground floor verandah and upper floor balcony; new iron columns and balustrade on the balcony similar to the originals; a new slate roof, reinstatement of front entrance doors not all operable and vaulted dormers made larger than the originals at the rear ; installation of new doors, windows, architraves and skirtings of earlier forms and profiles; and new moulded ceilings on the ground and first floors. It was at this time the building reverted to its original name of "Harris Terrace". In Harris Terrace provides offices spaces for a number of community organisations. The verandah is separated into six sections reflecting the original six houses. Each section has three French doors on the first floor, and two sash windows and the front door on the ground floor. The tiled gable roof features six chimneys and dormers with barrel shaped roofs and the bull nose verandah roof is corrugated iron. The first floor windows in the wings have round arches while the rear windows of the main building are flat arched. The roof dormers have barrel vaults and the wings are gabled. Harris Terrace, constructed as a row of six houses in , is important in demonstrating the evolution of residential housing in Queensland. A rare example of s terrace housing, the building illustrates the early use of this housing type in Brisbane. As one of only three remaining s terrace house buildings, Harris Terrace is important as a rare example of this type in Queensland. Beyond its rarity as terrace housing, Harris Terrace is one of few remaining s buildings in Brisbane City. The area immediately behind the building may contain archaeological evidence including the foundations of the service wings and s building additions. Artefacts within this area may include those commonly associated with domestic habitation such as glass, ceramics and bone, and some artefacts associated with commercial and office activity during the 20th century. In its dignified front elevation, form and scale, Harris Terrace is an important element of lower George Street, a streetscape dominated by late nineteenth century buildings. More widely, the building makes an important contribution to the government precinct that exists between George Street and the Brisbane River.
