Down he went into the dark depths of the Mediterranean, seaweed swirling about his head cf. Presently, he was devoured by a great creature of the deep. One might almost say that the Lord sent Jonah to school for three days, and the classroom was the belly of a great sea-monster. Jonah Preaches to Nineveh Making his way to Nineveh, a journey that would have taken more than a month and thus provided ample time for sober reflection, Jonah entered the great city with his blunt message consisting of only five words in the Hebrew text: Jonah was quite distraught at this turn of events and he despaired, even to the point of wanting to die. Resolutely, he perched himself on a hilltop nearby, eagerly watching the city in hopes that the Lord would yet destroy it. His education was still incomplete! As he sat in the scorching sun, God caused a shady vine to grow up for his refreshment and the prophet was glad. The Lord in effect said: Perhaps we could reflect upon a few of these matters. If these lessons are taught in sequence, expect some disagreement or uncertainty here. Then, I set the purpose for the lesson by describing our next activity. Today, we will observe the moon. How your students record their data is completely up to you! My students use marbled composition notebooks, and today they will glue in the Student Resource- Moon Observations. We will be taking them outside on clipboards! I show the recording sheet to students and they reflect about what they will be doing. I ask questions like: What do you think this rectangle will be for? Drawing the moon Will we draw a circle, or the actual shape of the moon today? Actual, accurate What do you think we might put here, under "My Notes? If it is not a full moon, then students begin to accurately record a different shape. The recording sheet also asks students to measure how far above the horizon the moon is. To do this, students use nonstandard measurement. I model how to measure with handspans. First, straighten both of your arms in front of you. Make your hands into fists. You will place one fist on top of the other. Move your arm until your bottom fist hits the top of the grass, the horizon. But one fist on top of the other and count how many fists high the moon is in the sky. I encourage students to help one another and compare their measurements. I also keep an eye out for any wacky numbers-- those friends need a little help! Children chose different notes to write, as you can see from our samples.

In the Nazi concentration camps, Frankl twice helped his fellow prisoners to come out of suicidal thoughts by making them realize their purpose in their lives. One man felt the responsibility to his unfinished work and the other man towards his daughter, whom he loved. These missions form our goals and destinies, which are different and unique for each of us. So, what do you think your purpose in life is? Even in the state of subjugation and torture by the Nazi troops, Frankl was able to endure his suffering by clinging his thoughts on his wife, whom he loved much. His wife had been separated from him by the Nazis and was sent to female concentration camps. He learned that love can go beyond the physical person of the beloved and finds its deepest meaning in their spiritual being. Despite the suffering in camps, Frankl always kept himself busy and active in writing his manuscript. This is a great lesson for us. Focusing on creative works, which are greater than ourselves, can help us in keeping our minds sharp and hence distract us from the terrible situations happening around us. Frankl advises us not to run after success since success, like happiness, can only happen when we fulfil our meaning of life. If we merely focus on becoming successful, we may end up as failure eventually. We should rather listen to what our conscious mind commands us to do while pursuing our passions, and should go on to dedicatedly work for it to the best of our knowledge without thinking about success. Like this, if we least care about the end results, one day, success will ensue as a by-product for our dedication and will follow us everywhere we go. No matter what the circumstance is, we always have the ability to choose how we react to the situations. We may lose our possessions, career, health and loved ones. A positive attitude in us enables us to endure suffering and disappointment as well as enhance enjoyment and satisfaction. While, a negative attitude intensifies our pain; it diminishes pleasure, happiness, and satisfaction or it may even lead us to depression or physical illness. In Nazi concentration camps, there were people who gave up their hope and died. Yet, there were some, like Frankl, who chose to live with positive attitude and got liberated finally. Be willing to embrace it! Through his experiences in concentration camp, Frankl repeatedly teaches us that life is meaningful under any circumstances and we should be willing to find it. Even when facing a fate that cannot be changed, life always has a meaning up to the last moment. Remember, if there is meaning in life, there must be a meaning in suffering. If we accept the suffering by taking up our own cross- it adds even still deeper meaning to our lives. If you can re-read this book again, you can find even more. This book has such a power to change our lives.

Genesis 3 Teaching Setting: Before the lesson the children participated in several songs and group Bible memory exercises. Target length of this lesson is 20 minutes. These lessons can be used with other story Bibles or by telling the Bible stories in your own words. Some choices lead to good things and other lead to bad things. Call on a volunteer to hold a book at arms length in front of them. Then ask them to choose to release the book from their hands. After the book falls to the ground, explain that it was the choice to release it that made it fall. Now repeat the demonstration but have an adult volunteer sit on the floor where the book will drop. This should be done carefully so no one gets hurt. Explain that our choices can often hurt other people. Ask for children to listen carefully for the following three questions as you read. These are the key points for them to understand from the lesson, so be sure to emphasize them as you read. Display the following questions on pieces of paper or marker board: What was the choice? What was the promise? Or tell the story of the Genesis 3 in your own words emphasizing the answers to the questions above. Be sure to engage the children with good story telling. Ask unscripted questions to clarify points in the story. Call on volunteers to answer the three questions from the story you just read. Their responses should be something like this: The people had to choose between obeying God or listening to Satan. God punished them because they disobeyed his Word, which was meant to rule over his place and his people. Call on three volunteers Adam, Even, Snake to act out the events from the story. You may want to bring an apple for visual effect. You can read portions from Genesis 3 to help. Then shares with Adam. Explain to the children that this choice to disobey God resulted in many bad things for all people. Remind the children of the book drop object lesson from the introduction. Explain that when we choose to disobey God it brings bad results into our lives. Our sin separates us from God. But God loves us and has made a way to be right with him once again. Learning lessons of history "The biggest challenge facing the great teachers and communicators of history is not to teach history itself, nor even the lessons of history, but why history matters. We know that history matters, we know that it is thrilling, absorbing, fascinating, delightful and infuriating, that it is life. For I presume the state has not received them from any other source. It would be ridiculous to imagine that the presence of the spirited element in cities is not to be traced to individuals, wherever this character is imputed to the people, as it is to the natives of Thrace, and Scythia, and generally speaking, of the northern countries; or the love of knowledge, which would be chiefly attributed to our own country; or the love of riches, which people would especially connect with the Phoenicians and the Egyptians. Even scholars, whose business it is to read, complain of its dullness. This fact may suggest that it is not rightly written for it should, should it not? Correspond to the whole of the mind, to whatever is lovely and powerful. No man can think that this all-containing picture if seen in good light could be devoid of interest. Hegel "History repeats itself because no one was listening the first time. This quote is sometimes paraphrased as: When change is absolute there remains no being to improve and no direction is set for possible improvement: Those who cannot remember the past are condemned to repeat it. In any future great national trial, compared with the men of this, we shall have as weak and as strong, as silly and as wise, as bad and as good. Let us therefore study the incidents in this as philosophy to learn wisdom from and none of them as wrongs to be avenged. The value of history, then, is that it teaches us what man has done and thus what man is. Collingwood "What man is, only history tells. Its chief use is only to discover the constant and universal principles of human nature. However obscure their causes, history, which is concerned with narrating these appearances, permits us to hope that if we attend to the play of freedom of the human will in the large, we may be able to discern a regular movement in it, and that what seems complex and chaotic in the single individual may be seen from the standpoint of the human race as a whole to be a steady and progressive though slow evolution of its original endowment. What is the stuff of which it is made? Who is the personage of history? There are many different elements in history. Evidently again, the elements of human nature. History is therefore the development of humanity, and of humanity only; for nothing else but humanity develops itself, for nothing else than humanity is free. Moreover, when we have all the elements, I mean all the essential elements, their mutual relations do, as it were, discover themselves.
